The *GRE*[®] General Test consists of three sections that provide admissions decision makers with valuable evidence of critical thinking skills: Verbal Reasoning, Quantitative Reasoning and Analytical Writing.

Understanding Analytical Writing

Analytical writing skills are critical for success in almost every graduate discipline. The Analytical Writing assessment consists of two separately timed tasks:
1) take a position on an issue and develop an evidence-based argument supporting that position; 2) evaluate the logical soundness of someone else's argument. These tasks assess the candidate's ability to:

 Articulate and support complex ideas with relevant reasons and examples

 Examine claims and accompanying evidence Construct and evaluate arguments
 Sustain a well-focused, coherent discussion
 Control the elements of standard
